


#### Preface

## Introduction

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


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We got married in September 1970. It was a blazing hot day: the men sweated in their top hats and tails and we all souinted at the camera.

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The preparations for our wedding day, (although modest by today's standards) had been substantial and had largely been made by our parents: all we had to do was turn up. By contrast the preparations for our marriage meanwhile had been, in any explicit sense, non-existent, but implicitly they too were made by our parents. They were the generation that sang 'Love and marriage, love and marriage, go together like a horse and carriage.' They believed in marriage and believed it was, "til death do us part', a safe, solid and sensible context for raising children and for life itself, even if they did not know why. We benefited from the security generated by that philosophy.

But we ourselves were the generation that sang 'All you need is love, dum da dada da'. That same generation went on to prove the falsity of that statement by divorcing in unprecedented numbers. Divorce rates continued to rise throughout the remainder of the twentieth century. Cohabitation is now the preferred option of many twenty-first century couples, anxious not to repeat their parents'

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mistakes. Not that there is any guarantee of permanence there.

The result of all this is, among many other tragedies, utter confusion about what marriage is. What should a couple expect of marriage? Why does it go wrong? What can be done to prevent it going sad and stale?

This book is written to answer such questions. Lovely couples too frequently end up at loggerheads. They need more than love: they need truth. We all do. Truth is to be found first and foremost in the Bible, the Maker's instructions.
