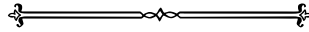

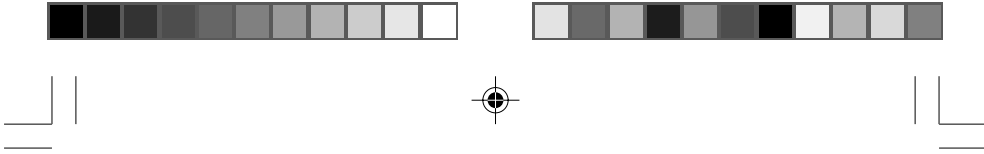

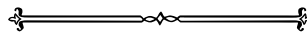

## Preface

I am quite serious. Are you satisfied? With life? Marriage? Singleness? Income? How about your progress toward your goals and aspirations? How satisfied are you with the circumstances that have fallen your way?

As I asked myself these same questions, two polarized memories, long buried in the back recesses of my mind, unexpectedly collided into one another. The head-on collision in my cranium was startling to say the least!

The first memory to burst into my conscious thoughts was the mournful, discontent sounds of Mick Jagger and the

Rolling Stones. Brain-cells, not opened since my teen years, suddenly released the words and sounds of their rock-n-roll hit: "I can't get no satisfaction!" I can still see that empty, defiant look in Mick's eyes as he buried his face in the camera and announced to the world his deep dissatisfaction with all that life offered.

The second recollection to speed down the highway of my memory included the words of a hymn we sang at our church just last Sunday. Nearly one hundred years ago Clara Williams wrote:



All my life long I had panted  
For a drink from some cool spring  
That I hoped would quench the burning  
Of the thirst I felt within.  
Hallelujah! I have found Him  
Whom my soul so long has craved!  
Jesus satisfies my longings;  
Through His blood I now am saved.



Mick and Clara were together in attempting to find satisfaction in life. Yet I am confident that Mick Jagger never sang any of Clara Williams' material. I am equally certain that Clara Williams could never have imagined any of the Rolling Stones' greatest hits. Though Clara and Mick were separated by the better part of a century and by an

infinity of spiritual understanding, both speak for people today. Jagger has the most followers, Williams the more happy.

May I re-introduce to you another song of satisfaction? It is a well worn favorite. You may think you already know what it is all about. I am confident, however, that you will be surprised. Are you ready? It is the twenty-third psalm. That's right—Psalm 23.
